The topic for work session was the Samuel Fleming House

The Borough Council and the Samuel Fleming House board members met to do an overview of the Samuel Fleming House Executive Board and the bylaws that they follow. The meeting started out with Yolanda Cillo giving a presentation on what a Public 501C-(3) means and how they as an organization fit into this category. The presentation showed how a few other towns work with the museums that are connected to their town. The presentation is attached to this document.

The Council and Board of the Samuel Fleming House discussed how they can work together and form a partnership to help come to an agreement on who appoints Board members and how this process can be agreed upon. The final decision was to form a smaller committee made up of three Council Members and three Samuel Fleming House Board Members to sit and come up with a plan to bring both entities into agreement about bylaws, who appoints Board members, etc.

A. Public Comments -- Session I (up to approximately 3 minutes each, for a maximum of approximately 30 minutes)

Lois Stewart, 26 Spring Street, Mayor you said that there were two issues where the bylaws and who appoints the board members. I feel that the much larger thing to me is the continued financial burden that this Borough does not have an overabundance of money and that many people that struggle to pay their bills would voice their concern that they are taxed for a museum. I remember very well that when this building was purchased by this Borough for the museum

it was agreed because there was a great concern from people about the finances back then that the building would be self-sufficient by the museum. They would not be running back every year to the Borough for money. That has never happened and I think the time has come when this Council needs to look at what the original intent for financial support was and what we can really afford now. So I am asking not only the three that are going to be on this committee but I am asking all seven of you to really investigate this and do what is best for the 4,000 plus tax payers in this Borough. Not what is best with the 11 or twelve board members of the Samuel Fleming House.

Mayor Greiner asked if it was Lois's recommendation that the Borough not own that museum.

Lois Stewart replied that she would have to have more information but she think that there are more avenues that could be pursued. If this Samuel Fleming House Board feels so strongly that this is such an addition to our larger community not just the Borough then they should set up this 503-C(3) legally and fix all the things that they are worried about. Then they should fill out an application to the County or some other place to get some money and buy the building from the Borough and then they can run it however they want. I was just concerned that they came in saying this is the way it is going to be and then they come to the Borough and ask us for money.

Mayor Greiner stated that we knew that it was not going to be a good combination. That is why we are trying to figure out how we are going to work it out so that we don't have that kind of confrontation.

Lois Stewart stated that this is a line item year after year and I am asking you to investigate and find some better way for them to run this museum.

Lois Stewart asked who did not stay within their budget this year?

Mayor Greiner stated that it was the repair for one of the pumps on one of the fire trucks. We passed a Resolution last Fall to authorize the money to pay for that because it was an emergency equipment that needed to be fixed and this budget transfer is simply to transfer \$10,000.00 to pay for that.

B. Mayor's Report (up to approximately 3 minutes)

Mayor Greiner was sad to announce that one of our crossing guards Josie Morgan has passed away on January 19, 2016 at the age on 91. She worked until about two weeks before her death. Mayor Greiner asked for a short moment of silence in her memory.

Mayor Greiner on January 5, 2016 met with newly elected Assemblyman Andrew Zwicker who came to Borough Hall. We had an interesting chat for about 45 minutes. He replaces Donna Simon and after providing a little overview of our town and some of the things that we have got going on projects. Mayor Greiner also took the opportunity to point out a few things about COAH and DEP regulations on sewer and water and the excessive pay outs of unused sick time to retiring employees that the State imposes. They make the choking high cost of living in New Jersey. Assemblyman Zwicker is a physicist at the Princeton Plasma Physics lab like Congressman Rush Holt was.

Mayor Greiner on January 8, 2016 toured the new Chick Fil -A building with the owner Ryan Reep and they will be opening on February 4, 2016 and if you don't know this Chick Fil -A has a ritual that if a hundred people come and camp out there for 24 hours ahead of time they get fed while they are there and they get a years' worth of free food from the restaurant. There will be more to come on this. When Mayor Greiner was over there the construction foreman had mentioned to me that we had one of the best code official crews that he has ever dealt with and he deals with official crews from all over the area. He lives in Pennsylvania.

Mayor Greiner reported that the Budget workshops are under way and we expect a completed review of every line item of expenses in our series of hopefully five workshops this year instead of six. We have completed two of the five and we aim to finish that series by February 18, 2016 and then we will be in a position to have more of a whole picture of where we are.

Mayor Greiner attended a meeting last Friday in Trenton with the DEP, Senator Bateman and members of our DPW team. The big question here is what are we going to do with these five year permit cycles that are just wearing everybody out with this wet weather facility? We came up with the idea that we will investigate pursuing an administrative consent order as a possible way to break the cycle. There will be more to come as we talk through what that might look like.

Mayor Greiner reported that the Street Scape project is coming along and we expect to award an engineering design company contract in February after having reviewed responses to the revised RFP.

Mayor Greiner reported lastly that he would be remiss to not recognize the DPW, OEM, Police and other emergency personnel for what was an outstanding job as usual by getting the snow removed. We always get a few complaints as why we did not put the snow there instead of here but all in all Mayor Greiner thinks it is a marvel with all that snow that everybody is able to drive around today. Thanks and a tip of the hat to our crew.

C. Council Members' Reports (up to approximately 3 minutes each)

Councilman Gorman

Councilman Gorman wanted to thank the DPW. Councilman Gorman talked to Mike Champion this afternoon and he said starting tomorrow morning around 5:00 a.m. they will be starting to work at intersections with backhoe's and dump trucks to try and clean out. Councilman Gorman knows some of the roads are narrow but without putting the snow on people's front porches they had to draw a line on how far they can go. Hopefully we will get some melting and rain and this will slowly disappear and the roads will get wider. They will continue to clean up when they see a problem, slush or something happening they will be on it. Councilman Gorman was going to bring up the hydrants but since that was already spoken about Councilman Gorman will just say that we have one on our street and the neighbors that live down there got on it and cleaned it out because 10 minutes can cause you your house.

Councilman Gorman attended the budget meetings and participated in the discussions.

Councilman Gorman reported that Shade Tree meetings have gotten moved around a bit. Councilman Gorman thinks with people being sick and the holidays and everything so they are trying to get things done. Councilman Gorman had the budget meeting at Borough Hall so therefore Councilman Gorman was not able to attend the meeting the other night.

Councilman Gorman attended the Recreation meeting and they went over budgets and fireworks.

Councilman Gorman attended the Street Scape meeting regarding the bids that the Mayor mentioned and that we hopefully are ready to pick someone. We have been going over the list and Councilman Gorman thinks we have a name and place but we are waiting to announce it.

Councilman Gorman reported that we have started with the engineer on the Capner and Allen Street project with the water pipes. As of right now they are not doing anything due to the weather but they were able to get started and that is a good sign. We had a meeting last week to get an update on where we are currently.

Council Vice President Hain

Council Vice President Hain attended January 5, 2016 meeting with Planning Board.

Council Vice President Hain attended January 12, 2016 meeting with Parks and Recreation Committee. Discussion about the 2016 Budget as well as some of the recreation classes. We set the date for this year's fireworks which is July 3rd with a rain date of July 5th. We are looking into having a possible raffle to at the fireworks to help offset the rising cost of programs.

Council Vice President Hain attended the January 14, 2016 and January 21, 2016 Budget workshops.

Council Vice President Hain stated that again as far as the passing of Josie Morgan she was a crossing guard since 1992. She worked for us for 22 years on the corner of Capner and Allen Streets. She will be greatly missed.

Council Vice President Hain received a letter from Chief Becker today that he is requesting that all sidewalks must be cleared of snow by this Thursday, January 28, 2016. If the sidewalks are not cleared you could be receiving a summons. So please if you have not done so already and you have sidewalks in front of your house please clear them before Thursday's deadline.

Council Vice President Hain reported that the police are working on replacing some of the crossing Guards for both Main Street and Court as well as Capner and Allen. We have someone interested and Council Vice President Hain is waiting for the final paperwork to come through. She will replace Dan Campbell. We are looking for someone to replace Josie at the Capner and Allen Streets. We have had some interest from some people and we are just waiting for the applications and paperwork to start coming in.

Council Vice President Hain just received the 2015 Police statistics:

Council Vice President Hain will be getting monthly updates.

Council Vice President Hain would also like to thank DPW, Fire and rescue. Council Vice President Hain knows a lot of people put in a lot of hours to keep the roads straight. Council Vice President Hain stated that when he got to

Sayreville this morning it was nowhere near leaving Flemington. You can see our guys really did a nice job.

Councilwoman Liebowitz

Councilwoman Liebowitz said that, to reiterate about the DPW, police and Fire department they did a great job. OEM also helped significantly in helping to get the message out so they had updates all the time from a communication standpoint. They did an excellent job. Councilwoman Liebowitz also shared their updates with other people who might not have subscribed for the updates. Councilwoman Liebowitz thinks that the communication was done very well.

Councilwoman Liebowitz stated that the Street Scape had two meetings and we received sixteen proposals for the revised RFP. We had a scoring system where we ranked them and three of the proposals we did not feel were qualified so we ended up tentatively awarding it to the lowest qualified bidder. We should be providing more information on that at our next meeting. We will be coming up with ordinances and getting together with them. This will be an exciting announcement and this project is moving forward and it will be good for Main Street.

Councilwoman Liebowitz stated there will be a Global Ag meeting on February 2, 2016 to get that off the ground.

Councilwoman Liebowitz attended the Library Board meeting and the annual meeting we reviewed the budget which we are presenting before Council on February 11, 2016. There is a group that supports the library called the Friends of Flemington Library and they are having their Annual meeting on January 28, 2016 at 7:00 p.m. where they will be discussing their programs for the year, successes from last year and everybody is invited to attend.

Councilwoman Liebowitz informed that the new website is fully in the development stage. This week there should be a new link that they will send out with the final design draft for our approval. Councilwoman Liebowitz is going to get that and will share it. The developer is working on the back end and we are on pace to meet the schedule that we have agreed upon and this should be the first week in February. They have been working with the Clerk's Office and they have been very helpful in getting a lot of the archived documents over to them.

Councilwoman Liebowitz stated that the Spring newsletter should be coming out in early March so Councilwoman Liebowitz encourage anyone here that has a department that wants to have an article in to reach out to their department heads. HPC is always good about getting their events in so she

expect to see a lot of stuff from that. The deadline will be February 15, 2016 but if you can get the items in next week that would be awesome.

It was asked of Councilwoman Liebowitz if there was a possibility if they can schedule that out for the year so we could know when the deadlines are.

Councilwoman Liebowitz will put this together and send it out.

Councilwoman Oberst

Councilwoman Oberst would like to thank our DPW, OEM, Rescue, and Fire. Our office of Emergency Management and Councilwoman Oberst thanked the team that we have in particular our Deputy and 1st Deputy Dave Giuliani and Brian McNally for their preparedness. They suggested that both the Fire Department and the Rescue Squad both staff people throughout the storm to be able to get out to rescue and save people. Councilwoman Oberst did receive a report back from the fire department that they were staffed from 8 p.m. on Friday through 10 a.m. on Sunday morning. They had three calls in the Borough and two of which our DPW assisted by plowing those areas so that the fire trucks could get in. One was on Youngs Drive and one was at Prospect Hills. The fire department wanted to thank the assistance they received from our own plow guys that are amazing. They also wanted to mention that if anybody has a fire hydrant on their property it will need to be dug out. There was an Ordinance that was passed in 2010 in the Borough that you can be fined. If you can't do or are unable to do it yourself and a neighbor cannot do it for you please call the fire department. Their number is (908) 788-5151 or Chief49@flemingtonfire.org. The fire department are out there tonight and will be back out there tomorrow so if anyone would like to help out feel free to contact the fire department. God forbid we have a fire it would take an extra ten minutes to dig out the fire hydrant before they can even hook up to help you. We encourage people to do this, it is the law that you have to do it. If you can't do it please call for help.

Councilwoman Oberst reported that the Business Improvement District has been meeting with the consultants. We have an Executive Session to give us additional information tonight which they have been providing the Mayor, myself and Brian. We are going to get some legal assistance from Rob Beckleman tonight and with our consultants on the phone. We will report back when we have more information regarding that. Councilwoman Oberst thinks they are moving forward to reconstruct and really help out the Business Improvement District to get something back up and functioning in a timely fashion.

Councilwoman Oberst stated that members of the Samuel Fleming House were here tonight for a one hour work session and we had a presentation from Yolanda Cillo. The bylaws was one of the topics of conversation and some

other items that we had legal advice on prior to the work session. We have set up basically a get together meeting to talk to them directly on a smaller basis so myself, Brian and Marc will represent the Council. Doris McGivney, Yolanda Cillo, and Kelli Dochterman will be representing the Samuel Fleming House. We will be going over some details and work out some arrangements with them. This will help with making agreement going forward.

Council President Swingle

Council President Swingle reported that we have been spending a lot of time with the BID consultants and have been moving forward and making progress.

Council President Swingle stated we have a meeting with the Global Ag Development Committee coming up and we have finally gotten this scheduled.

Council President Swingle stated that as far as the Chick-Fil-A opening, this does not happen overnight. It takes a lot of time and hours by the construction officials to make this happen. These guys rarely get mentioned and a big thank you to them for helping to redevelop Flemington. This requires them to do a great job.

Council President Swingle has been working with the Fire Marshall and as you can see there is an Ordinance on the Agenda tonight regarding late fees. This is due to landlords not paying their registration fees. We do not have anything on the books to do anything about this situation. This is why we need to make some changes in this Ordinance.

Council President Swingle stated that on the note of clearing the sidewalks, as a community please help your neighbors. If you have a snow blower get out there and help them. Do not let them sit out there for hours hacking away. Please get out there and help them if possible. Council President Swingle reported that he has shoveled out someone else's fire hydrant that was not even his own.

Council President Swingle reported that the power outage last night was due to a pole getting hit and the power being down for about four hours.

Council President Swingle reported that at the budget meeting we had a discussion about our computer system. When the power went out we had no email server. This is something to think about because if someone sent us an email it went into a black hole. The archive server needed attention and the video for tonight need to be reset. This is what happens when you are trying to maintain all this infrastructure locally and not putting it up on the cloud. This is an important thing for us to start thinking about.

Council President Swingle has one more thing about Dan Campbell. He was our court officer. He was our explorer for a long time and has put in a lot of hours for the Borough. Council President Swingle just wanted to thank him for all his years of service to us and to our community. We will have to look for a new Court Officer as well.

Councilwoman Tabussi

Councilwoman Tabussi attended the meeting in Trenton with regards to the Wet Weather Facility. This goes into conversation and work that we have been doing with the DPW for at least the past year that Councilwoman Tabussi has been with them and John even longer. So this is a step in this direction for us. Councilwoman Tabussi is looking forward to the work that comes out of that and seeing where this takes us.

Councilwoman Tabussi stated that there were two HPC meetings since the last council meeting. They are a busy group. We are currently looking for sponsors for the house tour. Councilwoman Tabussi thinks that each of you should have received a letter in your mailbox and we are still looking for docent. Again Councilwoman Tabussi encouraged everyone that is sitting to my left to consider being a docent. HPC is just doing an incredible amount of work.

Councilwoman Tabussi attended the two budget meetings and we are really digging in with that.

Councilwoman Tabussi stated that as far as the snow removal our DPW guys were out there from Friday night to yesterday evening. Some of them were called back in at about 2:00 a.m. this morning because another plow truck disturbed our electrical connection. So they had to come back in to make sure our water pump and everything continued to run. Please thank a DPW person next time you see them because not only did they clear all our roads they then had to go and dig themselves in to their own homes after serving all of us. They do not go home to a non-snow area so they have to go home to do all this work on their own properties.

Councilwoman Tabussi reported that there are some corners because of the amount of snow that we had causes some difficulty for all of us. So please be carefully going around some of the corners. We are clearing the roads to help with the fire trucks, buses and for all emergency vehicles first then they will be concentrating on the corners. If you see something and you can help out a neighbor, elderly and some of the sidewalks are not cleared please as a community help each other out. Councilwoman Tabussi knows that on Brown Street every single one of my neighbors was out yesterday and we all chipped in and help each other and that is what really makes Flemington a great place to live.

Councilwoman Tabussi stated that the next is the water meters and how it is showing up on our Agenda is for membership for the Morris County Pricing Council. In our budget meeting we discussed the need to replace our water meters for three quarter inch pipes. This is for a residential water meters. Following that meeting it was actually found that there is a cooperative pricing council in Morris County. Hunterdon County does not have one. We are able to buy into the Morris County one in order to buy those meters at a reduced cost. The nice thing about this is that it is a five year pricing council and that we are able to join in the very last year. We are able to take advantage of the reduced cost of purchasing those meters. This was something that we decided to move forward with almost immediately we found a way to get these at discount rates. Councilwoman Tabussi really wants to thank the work that our water and sewer department that is doing in researching all the different ways that we can keep cost down on these maintenance type projects.
