#### Mayor's Report

Mayor Driver summarized the topics discussed earlier in executive session - a personnel matter, the FCP's proposed 2022 budget, and cellular facilities at the Borough's water tower. Action will be taken regarding the FCP budget when Resolution 2021-244 is discussed.

She learned a lot at the NJLM annual conference last week.

On Dec. 15 there will be a joint Council and Planning Board meeting to view a presentation by Stantec on the Community Action Report stemming from the Opportunity Zone study.

She summarized upcoming activities, and also noted that Planner Beth McManus will be discussing the Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, which is due to be introduced tonight.

OEM Coordinator McNally will also give an update.

#### II. Council Members' Reports

Council President Giles-McCormick

She's been working with the FCP on the Neighborhood Preservation Program grant, and they're currently assembling a committee to implement the grant. Interested people can reach out to her or FCP Executive Director Robin Lapidus.

Council Vice President Long

He summarized recent action of the Planning Board, and said that board will be meeting again tomorrow.

Police- They're back to enforcing the parking regulations as COVID restrictions have eased. People needing permits can contact Borough Hall.

He discussed preparations for upcoming events- there will be several road closures for the Turkey Trot on Thanksgiving, and the Holiday Parade route will run in reverse this year, starting at the Monument and ending at Church Street. The mental health group will be meeting next week with representatives from Hunterdon Medical Center and NAMI.

He attended the County Commissioners' meeting about auctioning off the parking lot on Main Street, and discussed the status of that effort.

Council Member Johnston

Mr. Johnston had no comment to make.

Council Member Hand

The state DEP has approved the change in use for the Community Garden at Tuccamirgan Park. Ground leveling will likely start next month.

Council Member Runion

He's been working on the Sustainable Jersey application. The Borough has achieved 60 points worth of action items, bringing its total to 110 points, and 150 points are needed to attain bronze level certification.

Regarding the Main Street parking lot, he said retention of that site is important for the Borough.

Council Vice President Tilly

The Historic Preservation Commission met to discuss a painting project and a fence project, both of which were approved.

Fire Department officers are setting goals for next year.

III. Public Comments - Session I (up to 3 minutes each, for a maximum of 30 minutes)

Lee Roth, Main Street, commented on the parking lot on Main Street and suggested that since the County pays no taxes to the Borough for its property, it would seem reasonable that it give the lot to the Borough.

Michael Harris, Main Street, asked about the FCP's stance regarding the Main Street parking lot. He said losing a prominent parking area is cause for concern, and questioned officials' efforts to retain the lot.

Colleen Rossetti, 36 Pennsylvania Ave., asked Council to reach out to the Commissioners by writing a letter and requesting a conversation.

Joanne Braun, 77 Jefferson Court, Raritan Twp., said there's no public parking on that end of town and the county should gift the lot to the Borough.

Lois Stewart, Spring St. and Emery Ave., wrote a letter to the Council that the Clerk read, which discussed the need for retention of the Main Street parking lot as public parking and urged Council to write to the Commissioners.

#### IV. OEM Report

Coordinator McNally discussed arrangements for the Turkey Trot on Thanksgiving, the tree lighting on Dec. 3, and the Holiday Parade on Dec. 5. OEM will be expanding in the new year, and welcomes volunteers to serve on its emergency response team.

Responding to the Mayor's question about COVID status, he said the county is still in high transmission status under the CDC guidelines. Vaccine numbers are climbing but cases are still rising.

### 2022 Flemington Special Improvement District Budget, 1St Reading

**WHEREAS**, at its meeting of November 22, 2021, the governing body of the Borough of Flemington introduced and approved the Flemington Borough Special Improvement District budget for the period January 1, 2022 - December 31, 2022, which budget is annexed hereto; and

**WHEREAS,** after notice of advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation, the governing body of Flemington Borough conducted a public hearing on December 13, 2020, at 7:30 P.M.; and

**WHEREAS**, the governing body of Flemington Borough has determined that at least one (1) week prior to the hearing a complete copy of the proposed budget was (a) advertised; (b) posted in the Borough Clerk's office; and (c) made available to each person requesting the same before and during the public hearing; and

**WHEREAS,** all persons having interest in the budget were given the opportunity to present objections; and

**WHEREAS,** the governing body of Borough of Flemington, having considered the comments at the public hearing, is of the opinion that it is appropriate and desirable to ratify and adopt the budget without amendment as advertised; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:56-80 and N.J.S.A. 40:56-84, the governing body of Borough of Flemington is required to adopt the budget by resolution after closing the hearing;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the governing body of the Borough of Flemington that:

- (1) The Flemington Borough Special Improvement District 2021 budget is approved by the governing body of the Borough of Flemington and it is approved for the period of January 1, 2022 December 31, 2022 in the amount of \_\_\_\_\_\_, to be collected via the Special Improvement Tax.
- (2) The municipal assessor shall prepare an assessment roll setting forth separately the amounts to be specially assessed against the benefited and assessed properties in the District, as listed in the Ordinance establishing the District, which assessment roll shall include a description of the property and the name of the record owner of each such property;
- (3) This special assessment shall be collected with either the regular tax payment (or payment in lieu of taxes), or otherwise, on properties located within the Borough of Flemington as set forth within the Ordinance and the assessment as follows: Schedule A (Downtown) shall be assessed at 66%; and, Schedule B (Highway) shall be assessed at 34%;
- (4) Payments the District received by the Borough of Flemington shall be transferred to the Flemington Borough Business Improvement District Management Corporation to be expended in accordance with the approved budget; and
- (5) The Borough Clerk is hereby authorized to forward a certified copy of this resolution to Flemington Borough Business Improvement District Management Corporation, the Hunterdon County Board of Taxation, and the Director of the Division

of Local Government Services in the State of New Jersey Department of Community Affairs.

# An Ordinance of the Borough of Flemington Adopting the "Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, Flemington Borough,"

Dated November 18, 2021, in Accordance with the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A: 12A-7

WHEREAS, the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1, et seq., as amended and supplemented (the "Act"), provides a process for municipalities to participate in the redevelopment and improvement of areas in need of redevelopment; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Borough Council Resolution 2021-15, the Borough Council designated the Liberty Village Redevelopment Area, identified as Block 35, Lots 22, 23, 24, 25, 31, 53, 54, 69, 70 & 71 on the Borough of Flemington Tax Map (the "Liberty Village Redevelopment Area"), as an area in need of redevelopment pursuant to the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1, et seq. (the "Redevelopment Law"); and

WHEREAS, a draft Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, dated November 18, 2021 (the "Plan") was prepared by the Borough's Planning Consultant KMA Associates, in consultation with the Mayor and Borough Council and its staff and consultants; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution adopted November 22, 2021, the Borough Council referred the proposed Plan to the Borough Planning Board (the "Board") in accordance with the provisions of the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-7(e) for the purpose of obtaining a report of the Board as to whether the Plan is substantially consistent with the Borough Master Plan or is designed to effectuate the Master Plan, and for any recommendation deemed appropriate by the Board concerning the proposed Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan; and

WHEREAS, on December \_\_\_, 2021, the Board transmitted a report to the Borough Council finding that the Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, dated November 18, 2021, is substantially consistent with the Flemington Master Plan or is designed to effectuate the Master Plan, and recommending the adoption of the Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, dated November 18, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council has determined that the effective Redevelopment of the Liberty Village Redevelopment Area would be stimulated by adopting the Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan as set forth in the attachment to this Ordinance.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Borough Council of the Borough of Flemington, in the County of Hunterdon and the State of New Jersey, as follows:

- **Section 1**. The Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan dated November 18, 2021 be and hereby is adopted.
- Section 2. The Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, dated November 18, 2021, incorporated herein by reference, as if set forth at length, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Borough Clerk, meets the criteria, guidelines and conditions set forth at N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-7; and is otherwise in conformance with the provisions of the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1 et seq.
- **Section 3**. The Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, dated November 18, 2021, is consistent with the Borough of Flemington's Master Plan or is designed to effectuate the Plan.

Section 4. The Liberty Village Redevelopment Plan, dated November 18, 2021, shall supersede the existing zoning, and the Official Zoning Map is hereby amended to reflect the zoning set forth in the Plan.

Section 5. In the event that any section, part or provision of the Ordinance shall be held to be unenforceable or invalid by any court, such holding shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole, or any party thereof, other than the part so held unenforceable or invalid.

This ordinance shall take effect upon final passage, publication, and filing Section 6. with the Office of the Clerk of Hunterdon County, all as required by law.
